#### The Green Scene

Southwest Gas (SWG) SE Operations Center: Example LEED Considerations

Although a recent Southwest Gas Project has not yet been officially submitted for LEED certification through the United States Green Building Council, there were many LEED strategies considered in the design of the project to improve the energy usage and the sustainability of the new facility. I believe it serves as an example, that through a thoughtful design process, the owner of a building can benefit from the application of conservation measures.

#### For instance, this project considered:

- SS 1: Site selection to be near Henderson services.
- SS 5.2: Maximize site open space.
- SS 7.2: Large areas of shade canopies in parking, and reflective roof to minimize heat island effect.
- WE 1.1: Water efficient landscaping.
- WE 3.1: Water use reduction with efficient plumbing fixtures.
- EA 1: Optimize Energy performance with high efficient Aisen air conditioning system, daylighting, and skylighting.
- MR 2.1: Construction waste management.
- MR 5.1: Regional Materials, concrete tilt-up construction.
- IEQ 1: Outdoor Air delivery monitoring
- IEQ 6.1: Controllability of lighting systems with Simply 5 system.
- IEQ 6.2: Controllability of thermal comfort systems.
- IEQ 7.1: Thermal comfort design.
- IEQ 8.1: Daylight & Views, 75% of spaces.
- EA 1: 42% Optimization of Energy of new buildings over previ
  - ous base-line buildings.
- ID 1.1: Innovation is Design for Aisen system.
- ID 2: LEED accredited professional.

With careful planning a building project can take advantage of many conservation and green building techniques.













### SPOTLIGHT Curt Ench

GGWArchitects client, Curt Ench of the Durrant Group, Inc., is becoming very familiar with our valley.
